We responded to the <u>DWP consultation on DB Options</u>, setting out a number of risks with the proposals and suggested improvements. We also responded to the <u>Statement of</u> <u>Strategy consultation from the TPR</u>, recommending that TPR should consider requesting less information. Finally, we also responded to the PPF consultation <u>on Section 143</u> <u>valuations</u>, broadly welcoming the proposals due to the increased flexibility that they offer.

Committee News

The **Legislation Committee** discussed the timing of the first ORAs and is pursuing the matter with DWP.

The **Investment Committee** meeting this month featured two guest speakers. First, Sir Robin Knowles, who discussed the <u>recent Financial Markets Law Committee</u> <u>report</u> that he led on, about Pension Fund Trustees decision making in relation to climate change and sustainability. This was followed by Mark Hill, who is responsible for ESG, Climate & Sustainability Strategy, Policy and Analysis at The Pensions Regulator.

The Early Career Professionals Group

have <u>launched 'Meet the Institutions'</u> videos (all less than 10 mins in duration) on the SPP website where organisations including TPR, the Ombudsman and the PPF share their roles, who they interact with and who they aim to impact. The Administration Committee considered the abolition of the Lifetime Allowance which took place earlier this month and discussed industry engagement with HMRC both pre and post abolition.

The **CDC Group** commented on last months <u>FCA CEO Speech</u> referencing CDC, as well as this month's Hymans Robertson <u>paper on CDC</u> and the House of Commons <u>research paper on the subject</u>.

Parliamentary Engagement

The SPP has engaged with half a dozen politicians this month.

This includes Baroness Ros Altman (Conservative) on our DB Options and Statement of Strategy consultation and Stephen Timms MP (Labour) in relation to our findings that 60% of pension professionals, who attended our recent ESG event, believe ESG disclosure requirements lead to better real-world outcomes.

We also engaged with Lord Truscott (non-affiliated) and Baroness Pinnock (Liberal Democrat) and John Spellar MP (Labour) on leasehold reform and the potential impact this may have on pensions. SPP was <u>quoted at length during the House of Lords debate</u> on the Leasehold Reform Bill.

Women in Pensions 2024

SPP is proud to be supporting this year's Professional Pensions Women in Pensions and Rising Star Awards.

The full list of Women in Pensions nominees, from across the pensions landscape, was <u>published earlier this month</u> - the SPP would like to congratulate all those who have been nominated for an award, and wish them every success in their applications.

<u>Nominations</u> for the Rising Star Award are open until Wednesday May 15th, so please be sure to nominate outstanding individuals at the beginning of their career in pensions, or a role model or mentor for those starting out.

SPP in the News

SPP featured in the media on almost 30 occasions this month.

Simon Daniel, Chair of the Investment Committee was <u>quoted in the national</u> <u>media</u> in relation to government plans to scrap or reduce ground rents and the potential impact this may have on pensions.

SPP's response to TPR's Statement of Strategy in <u>Corporate Adviser</u>, <u>Actuarial Post</u>, <u>Professional Pensions</u>, <u>PensionsAge</u>, <u>Pensions Expert</u>, <u>Law360</u>, and <u>IPE</u> as well as our response to the DWP's proposals for the **future of DB schemes** which appeared in <u>PensionsAge</u> and <u>Professional</u> <u>Pensions</u> amongst others. Our response to the **PPF's consultation on s143 valuations** secured coverage in <u>Professional Pensions</u>, <u>Pensions Age</u> and <u>Pensions Expert</u>.

Comments from Keith McInally on the multi-employer CDC legislation was featured in <u>PensionsAge</u>'s April magazine (p23) and an article from Kirsty McLean on the **main challenges facing Public Sector pension schemes** appeared in <u>Professional Pensions</u>.

SPP's 'Meet the Institutions' videos were briefly highlighted in <u>PensionsAge</u> and our recent event on **ESG disclosure requirements** secured good coverage in <u>Corporate Adviser</u> and <u>PensionsAge</u>.
